WHEREAS, only counties that have adopted a construction evaluation resolution and submitted an adopted recommendation may contest the DNR's decision regarding a specific application; and

WHEREAS, by adopting a construction evaluation resolution the board of supervisors agrees to evaluate every construction permit application for a proposed confinement feeding operation structure received by the board of supervisors between February 1, 2005 and January 31, 2006 and submit an adopted recommendation regarding that application to the DNR; and

WHEREAS, the board of supervisors must conduct an evaluation of every construction permit application using the master matrix created in Iowa Code section 459.305, but the board's recommendation to the DNR may be based on the final score on the master matrix or may be based on reasons other than the final score on the master matrix;

NOW, THEREFORE, upon motion by Kinen, second by Rieken: BE IT RESOLVED that the Cass County Board of Supervisors hereby adopts this construction evaluation resolution pursuant to Iowa Code section 459.304(3). Carried unanimously.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity.

Motion by Rieken, second by McFadden to approve the application for "Renewal License for Off-Premise Liquor, Wine or Beer" and "Sunday Sales Privilege Application of Valley Mart, rural Atlantic (Applicant: Windmill Entertainment, LLC). Carried unanimously.

Sheriff Bill Sage discussed the disposition of a 2 door 1998 Tahoe. The sheriff believes the county would be best served by keeping the vehicle. Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to reject all bids received for a 1998 Tahoe. Carried unanimously. At 10:30 A.M. NRCS representatives discussed an update to the Cass County soil survey. Original survey done 1958-1962, published in 1969. Present data is inadequate for current needs in farm management, environmental decisions, appraisal, governmental programs, etc. Cost estimate if contracted this year: 41 cents per acre times 361,700 acres = \$446,784. County share would be 1/3 or \$148,928: \$29,786 each year for five years. It is estimated to take about 3½ years to complete the field work.

SWIMHC director Emerson Link submitted a FY06 budget presentation. Center is requesting for FY06 a contribution of \$196,000 (\$186,000 for SWIMHC and \$10,000 for a Drop-In Center), an increase of \$26,000. Should have a $2^{\rm nd}$ psychiatrist by July and hope to fill a vacant nurse practitioner position in FY06.

Monday, February 28, 2005

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with all members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. The minutes of February 23, 2005 were approved as read.

At 9:05 A.M. the Board proceeded with the hearing on the proposed Cass County budget for FY2005-2006. Notice was published in three official newspapers February 16 or 17, 2005.

No private citizens were present to present arguments in favor of or against the budget. No written or oral statements were received.

Recommendations of the Cass County Compensation Board for elected officer base salary increases were received. Recommendation 1: 2.5% for supervisors; 4% for auditor, recorder and treasurer; and 0% for attorney (whose classification was changed by the B.O.S. from full time to part time Oct 2004 and B.O.S. set salary at \$60,000/yr). Reported that B.O.S. member(s) contacted Compensation Board chair and requested that board reconvene and reconsider recommendation: asked compensation board to consider \$1,000 additional for B.O.S. chair and reconsider increase for attorney and other officers. Compensation Board reconvened and amended first recommendation to include 1% increase for attorney and passed motion to pay B.O.S. chair \$1,000 more than other members. Combined recommendations: 1% for attorney; 4% for auditor, recorder, sheriff and treasurer; 2.5% for supervisors and a separate recommendation that Board Chair receive \$1,000 more than other members. {Changes added by recommendation 2: 1% increase (\$600) for attorney and increase of \$1,000 for B.O.S. Chair. B.O.S. requested that a decrease of 25% of Compensation Board percentage recommendations be used in the proposed budget. Effect of 25% reduction: Overall decrease of about \$2,557 resulting in an increase of about \$7,671 in base salaries distributed among the ten elected officials.

Motion by Rieken, second by Kinen to reduce by 25% the percentage increases recommended by the compensation board. Carried unanimously. Result: Increases of .75% for attorney; 3% for auditor, recorder, sheriff and treasurer; and 1.875% each supervisor.

Motion by Kinen, second by Behnken to approve the recommendation that B.O.S. chair receive \$1,000 more than other B.O.S. members. Carried unanimously.

(2004-2005 Salaries: Each supervisor, \$22,270.54 (Chair \$23,270.40); Attorney,\$90,600.00; Auditor, \$41,025.60; Treasurer, \$41,025.60; Recorder, \$40,996.93; and Sheriff \$48,043.44) (salaries for elected officials set for FY2005-2006 as follows {where applicable cents rounded to be divisible by 24, the number of pay periods}: Each supervisor, \$22,688.16 (Chair \$23,688.16); Attorney, \$60,450.00; Auditor, \$42,256.32; Treasurer, \$42,256.32; Recorder, \$42,226.80; and Sheriff \$49,484.64)

Budget discussion: One citizen inquired as to the amount budgeted for Senior Citizens Cass Co.: amount is \$7,446; increased \$1,000 from FY0405 as requested.

Resolution 2005-02-28-001 Motion by Rieken, second by McFadden-RESOLVED: To adopt the expenditure budget (including Secondary Roads budget) as published. (See Certificate of Tax and Adopted Budget on page following this date's minutes). Carried unanimously.

Chair Volk declared hearing closed.

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with four members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden and Wm. Behnken. Charles Rieken at ISAC meetings. The minutes of March 9, 2005 were approved as read.

County Attorney Daniel Feistner reviewed current legal activity.

Wednesday, March 16, 2005 (continued)

NRCS representatives presented update on watershed projects. Seven projects, all 100% federally funded, are scheduled with three this year and four next year.

CADCO director Frank Spillers presented update in reference to a proposed ethanol plant. Cass County is still a possible site.

At about 10:30 (originally scheduled for 9 AM but Mr. Willcoxon found it necessary to attend a meeting in another county prior to coming to Cass County. Notice was sent to media of late arrival expectation, that is change of agenda, Monday but individuals notified by letter were not individually contacted.) Regional Water Association General Manager Jade Willcoxon presented an update on the project which includes provision of rural water to about a five square mile area of Cass County including sites near the Hwy 71/I-80 intersection. An ordinance directing capping of "for human consumption" current wells and prohibition of new wells "for human consumption" was passed in Cass County to facilitate the project. The construction costs for the Cass County portion of the project were funded by the Iowa Underground Storage Tank Cleanup Fund. Proposed agreements for usage by those within 500 feet of the contaminated site require a five year commitment and that monthly usage fees are the responsibility of the individual consumer. Land owners are not responsible for pit to house connection costs if they are within a 4,000 foot radius. County sanitarian Stephan Patterson was present.

Several prospective consumers were present. A request was made that the County pay the monthly usage fee. Board chair stated that the request will be considered.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects.

Wednesday, March 23, 2005

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with all members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. The minutes of March 16, 2005 were approved as read.

County Attorney Daniel Feistner reviewed current legal activity. Information packet regarding 'LUST cleanup' provided to all present. Corrective action activities for the area within a 4,000' radial distance from the Boston Road/650th St(Hwy 71) intersection (Local Underground Storage Tank sites: Overland Truck Stop, LUST #9LTH50; Harvest Moon Truck Stop, LUST #8LTI12; Valley Oil Phillips 66, LUST #8LTD99; and Korner Mart 76, LUST #8LTW71) were discussed. In order to facilitate DNR reclassification of the area, Seneca Environmental Services, firm providing protective activities at the Overland Truck Stop site owned by Cass County, was selected as the entity to help with coordination of activities to reduce the risk posed to human health and the environment for all four sites.

According to a 09/26/04 Seneca letter: "The four sites ... Tier 2 Site Reports ... have been reviewed and approved by the IDNR. Each report identifies multiple high risk drinking water well which lie within the actual and/or modeled Receptor ID plumes of one or more of the ... sites. The ... Iowa Risk Based Corrective Action Program outlined in Chapter 135 of the IA administrative code requires that high risk receptors identified in these reports be addressed via corrective action (RBCA) or further assessment under the Iowa RBCA Tier 3 provisions. ... Based on the data currently available through the Iowa DNR records desk, we recommend supplying water to all commercial and residential properties with a 4000 foot radius of the intersection of US Highway 71 and County Road G16."

On 08/12/04 the Board of Health met to "discuss the need to adopt new health rules for the County." After discussion, a meeting and public hearing was set for 09/02/04.

On 09/02/04 a public hearing was held regarding "Rules for Water Protection/Consumption in Areas Determined to be Contaminated and Uncontaminated Wells Located Within the Contamination Plume;..." After hearing and discussion, the rules were approved.

On 09/29/04 a special meeting of the Board of Health was held. After discussion on "Groundwater Protection Plan No. 1, Highway 71 and Interstate 80 Site.", the plan was approved. Plan filed with County on 10/07/04.

On 09/08/04 County Attorney Barry discussed whether the B.O.S. needed to adopt an ordinance regarding connection to rural water. No action was taken. On 09/15/04 the B.O.S. approved the rules adopted by the Board of Health on 09/02/04.

According to a letter dated 03/10/05 from IUSTF consultant James Gastineau "various alternatives were evaluated in regard to what might be needed to achieve the clean up goals for the individual sites. ... Based on the cost estimates provided for the corrective action, it was determined that bringing water to the area would be the most costeffective method for addressing the potential risk to the private water wells in the area. ... The B.O.S. concurred with the proposal and agreed to assist with the completion of an ordinance to serve as the institutional control to prevent future wells from being installed in the identified areas of contamination. ... Seneca was to contact each of the well owners in the area of contamination to seek permission to close the wells following

the installation of the new water system. ... largest area identified with wells at risk was from the assessment completed for the Valley Mart ... facility. ... 6000 ft. ... Data collected from this site in 2004 ... with remodeling of the data, the plume radius would decrease to approximate 3500 ft. ... It should also be noted that if the DNR accepts the Cass County ordinance as an effective control the risk classifications associated with the protected groundwater source could be reclassified to no action required. Reclassification of the drinking water well receptors will only be completed after the individual wells at risk have been properly plugged in accordance with DNR rule."

Beginning at about 9:10 AM when Seneca called a conference via speaker phone was held with Seneca representatives regarding four property owners within the 4,000' plume who, at this point had not agreed to 'hookup' to Regional Water.

Seneca noted that they were the firm retained by the IUST fund to complete work on one of the four sites. All work done and recommendations made must be in compliance with DNR rules. Recommendation made was based on information gathered by Seneca as well as by that supplied by the other three site cleanup firms. It is a county matter as to what property owners may do in accord with Cass County Board of Health and County ordinances. Seneca may act in regard to only one of the four sites. The 4,000' radial distance area was based on information for all four sites and arrived at using DNR model. When new information is available, then that information can be entered into the model and the radial distance may be recalculated with a potential reduction.

Twelve of sixteen sites have pits installed. Four have not. It is unlikely that a reduction in radial distance would place more than three of the four sites outside the plume.

Property owners commented that, at personal expense, well water was tested with no signs of contamination. Seneca replied that corrective action was taken in order to protect against a potential future contamination of individual wells. It was asked if the twelve voluntarily hooked up to rural water. Qualified answer was: yes.

Asked about infiltration via underground PVC pipe, Jade Willcoxon of Regional Water commented that special pipes and connections were used within a 500' plume.

Property owners stated that they feel they are victims and feel they should not be required to pay hookup fees as well as recurring provision fees. They asked if waiver of requirement for hookup could be granted.

County sanitarian Steve Patterson noted that he was opposed to granting waivers but suggested the Board of Health table enforcement of the rule/plan provisions. Action would seem proper only after receipt of documentation stating acceptance of any changes with signatures of DNR. The Board of Health will meet and consider amendment to comply with DNR requirements.

Jade Willcoxon commented that hookup and pit to house connections are covered by the IUST fund for those who have signed for hookup. He stated that it is possible that for those who delay signing, such funding may not be available. The last date for procuring IUST funding will be researched.

Upon advice of the County Attorney Dan Feistner, the four members present (Chuck Rieken left earlier to attend a meeting in Council Bluffs) in regard to the "Rules for water protection/consumption ..." and "Groundwater Protection Plan No. 1", that the County would not move forward with enforcement at this time against the four property owners (G. Leslie, Dallas Westphalen, Darrell Begley and Pug Bowers). And that the County would not move forward with enforcement until written/signed advice is received from IUSTF/DNR and after consideration and action, if any, upon that advice by the Board of Health.

County Attorney Daniel Feistner reviewed current legal activity.

In an order dated 03/15/05 in the matter of His Acres Foundation vs. Cass Co. Zoning Board of Adjustment, the court affirmed the decision of the Zoning Board. ("The court finds that the board of adjustment acted reasonably and in accordance with the zoning ordinance in determining that a variance was not warranted.")

In regard to the UST contamination site project and regional water, the attorney drafted five letters: three stating likelihood of being outside a new revised radius and two stating it was unlikely change would place outside. Probably take two or more months to generate new reports for the four contamination sites.

A draft of the revised Cass County Zoning Ordinance was presented by the attorney and zoning administrator. Further review of the draft set for April 13.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden: RESOLVED to make the following expenditure appropriations effective April 1 (10th month additional 1/12): Jail plus \$25,813 ($1/12^{\rm th}$ of \$309,752); Sheriff \$53,664 ($1/12^{\rm th}$ of \$643,954). Carried unanimously.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity.

The county auditor in regard to mandated replacement of election equipment before the 2006 elections updated the board on HAVA funding. Approximately \$105,800 has been allocated from HAVA funds for Cass County. One quote of about \$204,000 for equipment has been received. In accord with Iowa Code Chapter 49 precinct boundaries may be changed to save election costs. Cass County now has 17 precincts. Maximum allowable redefining of precinct boundaries could reduce the number to 11. Equipment per precinct (one scanner and one ADA machine) is about \$10,000; recurring cost of about \$350 to \$500 in annual maintenance fees and of about \$600-\$800 biannually for precinct workers (may need to add workers for the new larger precincts).

As published the Board held the first hearing on amendment of Ordinance No. 19. The purpose of this amendment is to re-precinct Cass County, Iowa by amending ORDINANCE # 19. Iowa Code 49.8(6) allows a county to re-precinct to "effect a substantial savings in election costs".

Chair Volk noted that the hearing was to discuss the revision of the current voting precinct ordinance in order to save election costs under the mandate to replace all voting equipment. The chair deferred to county auditor/election commissioner Dale Sunderman to present an update on reason for present consideration.

The proposal is to combine all precincts allowable and thereby to reduce the cost of equipment required by HAVA. HAVA requires at least one disabled persons accessible machine in each polling place. In Iowa a precinct and a polling place are synonymous. Secondly equipment installed must allow the voter to 'check' his/her ballot and thus a precinct reading of the ballot must be available. The recommended solution is to place one paper ballot scanner in each precinct plus one direct recording electronic machine with audible signal in each precinct. The estimated cost is \$10,000 per precinct plus central processing equipment. With 18 precincts, including the absentee, an estimate received was \$240,000. Certain federal HAVA (Help America Vote) funds are available. Another rough estimate by another vendor was \$180,000 to \$200,000. Cass County's share has been set at \$105,833.

Most Iowa counties have or are considering reducing the number of precincts. At least one county has proposed four (plus absentee) precincts. The B.O.S. does not have authority to change city precincts. Cities do not have the authority to change precincts (that is, amend ordinance) after initial adoption at the beginning of a decade to save election costs.

A county board may reduce the number to "effect a substantial savings in election costs". Cass County currently has 17 precincts (18 with the absentee). Precincts may not have a population of more than 3,500 persons. Legislative districts may not be combined. Supervisor districts may not be combined. Therefore, even though they comprise a lower population precinct, Benton Township, Union Township/Cumberland and Victoria Township may not be combined with other townships/cities. The only allowable combinations are

- (1) Brighton/Marne with Grove/Pymosa/Washington;
- (2) Edna, Bear Grove/Noble, Cass/Lewis with Pleasant/Griswold; and

(3) Franklin/Wiota, Massena/Massena with Grant/Anita/Lincoln. More than 20 percent of the voters who cast ballots in the 2004 General Election voted "absentee'. That percentage is expected to increase. Current statutes do not provide for voting entirely by mail.

The B.O.S. proposes to reduce the initial costs for equipment replacement by reducing the number of precincts. This would also reduce the recurring costs for equipment maintenance and servicing and probably allow for a reduced number of precinct election officials. For Cass County it appears that the maximum reduction allowable is from the 17 current precincts to 11 precincts. Such reduction may bring the estimated costs down from \$180-240,000 to possibly as low as \$120-180,000.

Citizen comments in regard to possible use of satellite voting stations prior to federal elections; increased travel distances; polling place administration; etc.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to approve amendment of Ordinance 19 and the combining of precincts from 17 to 11 on first reading. Aye: Behnken, Kinen, McFadden and Volk. Naye: Rieken. (Rieken indicated he desired additional comment from constituents before voting in favor of the amendment.)

Second hearing and possible final reading set for May 11.

Chair proclaimed the hearing concluded.

At 9:10 a.m. as published the first of two hearings for approval/adoption of amendments/update to Cass Co. ordinance #3, a zoning and subdivision ordinance, was held.

(Present: Board, Auditor, Attorney, CADCO director Frank Spillers, Don Sonntag, ANT reporter Laura Bacon, Engineer Charles Marker and Zoning Administrator Richard Hansen.)

The purpose of this ordinance is to add all changes enacted since the amendment in 1982 and to amend certain sections and to add certain items needed for new uses, etc not in existence in the 1982 amendment.

It was noted that two previous meetings had been held to consider and to develop the final form of the ordinance. This is the first hearing of at least two to approve and adopt. It was noted that no written or oral comments were received since notice of these hearings was published.

The county attorney noted that this was an update and amendment to the original ordinance. In addition to the final full text, a compilation of changes as finalized was composed and made available.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to approve amendment and update of Ordinance #3 upon first reading. Carried unanimously.

Attorney discussed final format of document- recommended loose leaf binding with 'content/changes' page at front.

Second reading/hearing May 31. Chair declared hearing closed.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity. A general assistant client request was denied based on not eligible due to

monthly income. U of I papers will not be available after July 1 (About 24 residents currently using those papers. New program for service provision begins July 1. CPC anticipates increase of claims for the county.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects. Whereas snow removal, etc necessitated expenditures exceeding a 10% change for certain service areas of the secondary roads DOT budget, state statutes/budget rules require amendment of DOT budget. Total appropriation for control items of secondary roads budget remains the same and county budget does not need to be amended (line item appropriations will be amended). DOT appropriations are on file in office of engineer and auditor.

Motion by Rieken, second by McFadden to approve amendments to Secondary Road Budget as submitted by county engineer. Carried unanimously.

SIRWA Manager Dan McIntosh met with the board in regard to a proposed water distribution grid system. A resolution of support for concept of the grid system was passed by the Cass County Board of Supervisors 10/29/2004.

Motion by Kinen, second by Rieken to enter into 'Agreement for Joint Financing of Water Development Facilities- Water Distribution Grid System' (between SIRWA and counties of Adair, Adams, Cass, Clarke, Decatur, Madison, Ringgold, Taylor and Union). Cass County share 9.375% (not to exceed \$46,875. Payable when water is available (estimated 5 years in future.) Based on loan maximum of \$500,000.) Carried unanimously.

PURPOSES: By planning for future source and treatment capacity, the anticipated improvements to the water utility system would enable SIRWA to deliver potable water to the SIRWA service area from multiple sources. This would provide redundancy of water service or treatment capacity necessary in times of low pressure or supply; provide security against natural disaster and terrorist threat; provide increased capacity and opportunities for economic development purposes; and improve the economy of water utility service to the residents of Southwest Iowa.

SIRWA agrees that it shall not change in any substantial manner the existing water service areas presently existing without the consent of the affected treatment sources, except where necessary to meet short term capacity or pressure requirements.

The purpose of this agreement is to authorize SIRWA to apply for loans and grants, if needed, from the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture to be used toward the costs of planning and constructing water source improvements for the rural water service area and to provide for a division of liability for repayment of those loans. At the present time there are three water source development agencies within SIRWA's service area: Gooseberry Lake Agency in Ringgold County, Clarke County Reservoir Commission in Clark County, and 102 River Valley Authority in Taylor County.

CADCO director Frank Spllers noted that cities in Cass County are working with the problem of dilapidated properties. A significant concern is cost of disposal of debris at landfill. Most cities have improvement groups and are working on revitalization and development. Audubon County economic development director has taken other employment. Joint county economic development programs have been opined allowable.

County Sheriff Bill Sage reported that old credit cards have been cancelled and new cards have been procured from same provider used by other county departments. The Court system is requesting that a uniformed deputy be present in courtrooms during proceedings. It was reported that three cameras in the corrections facility needed maintenance or replacement. A copy of notice of appointment of designees authorized in accord with IOWA CODE 805.6(5) to administer oath on Iowa uniform traffic citations, pursuant to IA CODE 805.6(5), 63A.2(3) and 63A.3 was filed.

10:30 a.m. an end of project hearing was held on Community Development Block Grant 02-WS-052. SWIPCO representative Lynn Easton presented the following information:

The Cass County Rural Water Expansion Project is complete. The CDBG program requires a public hearing to inform the public of the project progress. The project was completed with sub-recipient Southern Iowa Rural Water Association (SIRWA).

The project was awarded a \$550,000 CDBG grant and a \$3,050,000 loan/grant combination from USDA-RD (2,088,000.00 loan & \$962,000 grant).

Howard R Green was hired to complete the design and construction engineering work with a contract amount of \$237,250.00.

Max Smith Construction was hired to complete the distribution system. The contract price was \$2,289,811.88. Change orders resulted in a final contract price of \$2,566,311.77.

Phoenix Fabricators & Erectors, Inc. were hired to complete the construction of a 150,000 gallon water tower. The contract price was \$309,016.00. Change orders reduced the total payment to \$308,555.20.

SWIPCO was hired to complete project administration with a contract amount of \$10,000. Total cost to date: \$10,000.

SIRWA has also paid \$743,494.25 in interim financing loan fees, land, ROW, bond council, legal, interest, inspections, archeological surveys and miscellaneous.

Total project cost was \$3,865,611.22. SIRWA has a loan on the remaining project cost of \$265,611.22.

Project is 100% complete.

The original benefit of this project was to the residents of the county in which the rural water service was extended to, especially the 68.99% of those determined to be of low-moderate income.

There being no further comment. The chair declared the hearing closed.

CHAPTER IV - SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS

New Section

- **4.3** <u>Telecommunications Towers</u>. In any district where radio, television, microwave, cellular, or other communication towers are allowed as a permitted or Special Permit Use, such towers are subject to the following additional requirements.
 - 1. Tower Siting.
 - a. It is the policy of the County to encourage co-location of new communications towers with existing towers or as part of suitable existing structures. All applications for approval of a communications tower location shall include evidence that all potential alternatives for location on existing towers have been explored and exhausted. Applicants may not be denied space on an existing tower within the County and its jurisdiction unless mechanical, structural, regulatory factors, or legitimate business expansion plans prohibit co-location.
 - b. The applicant for a communications tower location is required to demonstrate as part of its application that the tower must be located on the proposed site in order to satisfy its function in the company's system. The applicant must also demonstrate that the proposed height is the minimum height necessary for the successful functioning of the tower.
 - 2. Tower Setbacks, Design, and Height
 - a. Free-standing towers shall be located so that the distance from the base of the tower to any adjoining property line or the supporting structure of a separate neighboring tower is a minimum of 100 % of the tower height. The Planning Commission may recommend and the County Supervisors approve a reduction to the set back with a Special Use Permit if they determine that such reduction does not constitute a hazard to safety or property on adjacent properties or rights-of-way.
 - b. The tower installation shall be designed to be aesthetically and architecturally compatible with the built environment of the County. The County encourages efforts to hide towers or restrict their visibility from public right-of-way or neighboring properties. Associated support buildings shall be designed with materials that are consistent with those in the surrounding area. Metal exteriors shall generally not be permitted for accessory support buildings.
 - c. All tower installations shall maintain landscaped peripheral yards with a minimum depth of 35 feet from surrounding property lines.
 - d. As part of the Special Use Permit approval process, the County may permit the tower to exceed the height restrictions otherwise allowable in the district.
 - e. Towers shall have a color generally matching the surroundings or background that minimizes their visibility, unless a different color is required by the FCC or FAA.
 - f. Lights, Signals and Signs: No signals, lights or signs shall be permitted on towers unless required by the FCC or the FAA. Should lighting be required, at the time of construction of the tower in cases where there are residential users located within a distance which is 300% of the height of the tower from the tower, then dual mode lighting shall be requested from the FAA. Lighting on towers shall not exceed the minimum requirements of the FAA or other regulatory agencies.
 - g. Adequate security measures are required at the base of the tower to prevent vandalism or hazards resulting from casual access to the facility.
 - 3.. County Site Selection Criteria in Evaluating Applications for Communications Towers
 - a. Consistent with the policy of this Ordinance, the telecommunications company proposing to construct an antenna support structure, or mount an antenna on an existing structure, shall demonstrate, using technological evidence, that the antenna must go where it is proposed in order to satisfy its function in the company's grid system. Further, the company must demonstrate by technological evidence that the height requested is the minimum height necessary.
 - b. Applications for necessary permits will only be processed when the applicant demonstrates that it is either an FCC licensed telecommunications provider or has in place necessary agreements with an FCC licensed telecommunications provider for use or lease of the support structure.
 - c. Personal wireless service facilities should be located and designed to minimize any impacts on residential property values. Sites should be placed in locations where the existing topography, vegetation, buildings or other structures provide the greatest amount of screening.

- d. Location and design of sites in all Districts should consider the impact of the site on the surrounding neighborhood and the visual impact within the zone district. In residential districts and residential land use areas, the minimum lot size for towers shall be three acres
- 4. <u>Priorities for Siting</u>. The following establishes the order of priorities for locating new communications facilities:
 - a. Public property, (excluding prairie, conservation or wildlife areas, or historic structures).
 - b. Appropriate existing structures, such as buildings, towers, water towers, and smokestacks in other zoned districts.
 - c. AG, AE, IL or IH districts that do not adjoin or adversely impact residential neighborhoods.
 - d. Private non-residential property in B district.
 - e. Private, non-residential properties in B district.
 - f. Place antennas and towers on multi-family residential structures exceeding thirty feet (30') in height in districts zoned SR and RR.
 - g. Residential districts only if locations for which a need has been demonstrated are not available on existing structures or in non-residential districts; and only on or in existing churches, parks, schools, utility facilities or other appropriate public facilities.
 - h. An applicant for a new antenna support structure to be located in a residential zoning district shall demonstrate that a diligent effort has been made to locate the proposed communications facilities on a government structure, a private institutional structure, or other appropriate existing structures within a non-residential zoning district, and that due to valid considerations including physical constraints, or technological feasibility, no appropriate location is available. The telecommunications company is required to demonstrate that it contacted the owners of structures in excess of thirty feet (100') within a one-quarter mile radius of the site proposed, asked for permission to install the antenna on those structures, and was denied for reasons other than economic ones. The information submitted by the applicant shall include a map of the area to be served by the tower, its relationship to other antenna sites in the applicant's network, and an evaluation of existing buildings taller than thirty feet (30'), towers and water tanks within one-quarter mile of the proposed tower.

4.4. Wind Energy Conservation Systems (WECS)

- 1. The distance from all lot lines or any building or power line to any tower support base of a WECS shall be equal to the sum of the tower height and the diameter of the rotor. A reduction of this requirement may be granted as part of a Special Use Permit approval if the County Supervisors, after recommendation by the Planning Commission, finds that the reduction is consistent with public health, safety, and welfare.
- 2. The distance between the tower support bases of any two WECS shall be the minimum of five rotor lengths, determined by the size of the largest rotor. A reduction of this requirement may be granted as part of a Special Use Permit approval if the County, after recommendation by the Planning Commission, finds that the reduction does not impede the operation of either WECS.
- 3. Any tower or rotor shall maintain a distance of at least 100 horizontal feet from any structure, power line, or antenna located on another property.
- 4. The WECS operation shall not interfere with radio, television, computer, or other electronic operations on adjacent properties.
- 5. A fence eight feet high with a locking gate shall be placed around any WECS tower base; or the tower climbing apparatus shall begin no lower than twelve feet above ground.
- 6. The height of the WECS may exceed the height restrictions of the base district by up to 50%. The bottom tip of any rotor must be at least 10 feet above any area accessible to pedestrians.

considered. The board considers the creation of hazardous waste collection site to be a community betterment project.

Motion by McFadden, second by Behnken to contribute \$5,000 from the Local Option Sales and Services Tax Fund to the Cass County Environmental Control Agency to help establish a satellite household hazardous waste disposal center. Carried unanimously.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects. Application of rock other than spot rocking expected to be completed by month end. Engineer's employment contract requires renewal. Utility company placing new poles across north side of county and county has permitted new ingress/egress drives across county right of way.

Chair Volk: "The board is here today to discuss an offer on the property known as Harvest Moon Truck Stop (the former Warren oil truck stop). The property was given to the county by a group of local investors late last year. The county started working with the DNR to finish the clean up of water contamination problems. The issue was helped along by the county effort to bring rural water to the area. With the co-operation of the area residents involved, this was completed in June. We have been working with CADCO to market the property, with the future plan to develop the I-80 and Hwy 71 area as a business park. We are also involved in a plan that would co-op with Audubon County for development of the I-80 area. The offer is for \$45,000, with a down payment of \$500. It is from Ken Tolton, vice president of Duke Aerial. According to Iowa State Code, 331.361, we have to have a hearing before we can accept an offer. A copy of the resolution has been prepared and the hearing on it will be June 22, at 9:30 AM in this room. At this time we look very favorably on the offer. Here to represent CADCO and Mr. Tolton is Don Sonntag, Site and New Business Recruitment Task Force Member, who has worked hard to help us reach this point."

Don stated that the CADCO task force and Audubon County are working on a project to develop the area near Hwy 71 along I-80. This property donated to the county by R-T-J earlier this year is included in the project. Certain things must be completed before a transfer of this property may take place: included are a permit from DNR, additional cleanup of the site, transfer to county of small parcel south of this property (septic field), etc. The task force believes this is a very acceptable offer. A brief history of Duke Aerial was related as well as their plans for this site.

Motion by Kinen, second McFadden: to hold a public hearing on June 22, 2005 at 9:30 AM in the BOARD ROOM of the CASS COUNTY COURTHOUSE. Subject: Consideration of an offer to purchase from Tolton Investments, LTD. "The CONTRACTOR agrees that any space leased, rented or owned of which the Contractor has control to mandate a policy will be tobacco free. This section does not apply to portions of facilities used

Tuckpoint work on four county properties was discussed. Consensus was that some work should be done immediately but other work could be scheduled for a future date. Estimates were received from two firms: Schoonover and Karr.

Wednesday, July 13, 2005

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with all members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. The minutes of July 6, 2005 were approved as read.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity. Drop-in Center report presented. Report on client at Glenwood.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects and presented updated project map. About 1/3 of projects completed. Dust control on roadway near county home driveway and disposal of county farm barn discussed.

At 10 a.m. purchase of election equipment to comply with HAVA was discussed. First considered: whether to go all DRE (direct recording equipment) or combination of DRE and paper ballot precinct scanners. Whereas one DRE must be provided for each (maximum of) 350 persons (industry standard is one per 250 persons) the number of machines required would make the all DRE option more costly than the combination option. Therefore the board consensus was for the combination option. Estimates for Diebold, Sequoia and E S & S equipment were reviewed. A motion was made to select a vendor but it was withdrawn when it was noted that today's agenda did not specifically state that action would be taken. Selection of vendor scheduled for July 20th meeting.

The board discussed whether or not to hold public hearings to consider amendment of <u>County Ordinance 19: B.O.S. Districts and Federal Election Precincts</u>. The auditor had been asked to prepare equipment cost estimates for three vendors based on the current 17 precincts, 13 precincts and 11 precincts. Member Rieken proposed that consideration be given to reduction to 16 precincts: Combine Edna Township with Bear Grove/Noble Townships. Member Volk commented that the consensus from the July 6 meeting was, in reference to 'substantial savings in election costs', to consider only the options to reduce by either 4 or 6 precincts.

After discussion: motion by Kinen, second by Volk to hold public hearings on a proposal to amend Ordinance No. 19 and establish 13 election precincts (reduction from current 17). Hearings scheduled for July $21^{\rm st}$ and $28^{\rm th}$.

Further discussion: Clarified that no action on change is being taken today. This sets up public hearings to provide opportunity for public input.

Vote: Carried unanimously.

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with all members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. The minutes of July 13, 2005 were approved as read.

County Attorney Daniel Feistner reviewed current legal activity. Buyer of former Harvest Moon property has requested an updated abstract. Offer of employment made for attorney's office secretary. Metal detector has arrived- probably will be utilized outside courtroom.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity. Client request for rent payment to landlord (who had paid the utility company) approved (s.o.p. to remit only to utility).

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects. Co Road G-30 Relocation bid came in about 23% over estimate. Sent to FAA for consideration to fund or new bidding. Vogel Traffic Services low bidder for sec. road pavement markings: \$13,574.80. Blacktop Service Co bid estimate for seven 2005 patching and seal coat projects: \$79,161.14. Board authorized engineer to contract dust control for up to 800' north and south of county home entrance and 200' up driveway.

Discussion on election equipment vendors: E S & S; Sequoia and Diebold. Determined that lowest cost estimate was for Diebold equipment. Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to purchase Diebold election equipment to comply with HAVA. Carried unanimously.

At 10:30 a.m. dive team members met with the board: purpose- "to explain the benefits received from the dive team, and explain need of funding." The dive team started in the late 1980's, became inactive and rejuvenated in 1998. At that time the county and the city of Atlantic provided some funding. Since that initial funding the only funding has been member dues. If the team is to continue, funding is required. Estimated recurring annual expense: \$520. Estimated every 4-10 year expense: \$4,440. DNR representative stated that DNR is supportive of dive teams but they are not a funding source. Sheriff Bill Sage and EMA coordinator Robert Koppert noted (for accountability and liability issues) that the dive team probably should be organized under a fire department. It was asked whether working in conjunction with another county's dive team were an option. If organized under a fire department, additional funding (including grants) would be available. Chair Volk noted this was an informational meeting and that it appeared that further study is necessary. Funding and organization issues will be researched. Meet again in two weeks.

In accord with Iowa Code section 331.904(4) "The board shall determine the compensation of extra help and clerks appointed by the principal county officers."

Motion by McFadden, second by Rieken to set the following pay rate for FY2005-2006:

Non union Jail assistant Lori Schroder \$10.30. Carried unanimously.

Thursday, July 21, 2005 PUBLIC HEARING- AMEND ORD.#19

Beginning at 7 p.m. a public hearing was conducted to consider amendment of Cass County Ordinance #19- Purpose: re-precinct to "effect a substantial savings in election costs. Board members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. Approximately 30 members of the public attended (most from the area of Lewis).

Hearing called to order at 7 p.m. by chair Volk. Opening remarks included: the purpose of the meeting and why such action was being considered. The Help America Vote Act (HAVA) was enacted by Congress in Oct. of 2002. HAVA requires that voting systems meet certain standards. The county must replace the current voting system and equipment with equipment compliant with HAVA rules. The voting system must provide independent access for individuals with disabilities. HAVA is a federal law; HAVA funding is available with Cass County estimated to receive approximately \$112,000; those monies are not available for a central count system as the primary system; the equipment vendor has been selected; an available way to effect 'substantial savings in election costs is to reduce number of precincts; State law does not allow combination of multiple local city election precincts (in Cass County only Atlantic has multiple precincts); precincts in differing State legislative districts cannot be combined; precincts in differing county supervisor districts cannot be combined; this ordinance prescribes precincts for federal elections only; each city remains a local election precinct; similarly for schools; other accessibility issues at the polling sites must be resolved- door handles, parking, etc. Chair Volk noted that State law restricts what changes in precincts may be made. Within those strictures the plan chosen by the board for consideration at these public hearings was to reduce the number of 'federal election' precincts from 17 to 13. Under this plan the persons affected are Edna and Noble Twp would combine with Pleasant Twp/Griswold; Bear Grove Twp would combine with Cass Twp/Lewis; Brighton Twp/Marne would combine with Grove Twp and Pymosa Twp and Washington Townships; and Franklin Twp/Wiota would combine with Grant Twp/Anita/Lincoln Township.

McFadden noted that the majority of persons questioned believe that voting by mail will increase and most are interested in saving tax dollars. If Marne/Brighton Twp Precinct is combined with the three townships currently voting at the Cass County Community Building, SWIPCO could provide transit from Marne to Atlantic on a federal election day.

Rieken noted that he believed each voter should be able to vote in his/her home precinct and that \$40,000 savings was not substantial enough to consider reducing the current number of precincts. Some grants are available for upgrading federal election polling sites for handicap accessibility. If upgraded these sites could also provide meeting areas for other purposes.

Public comment included: A polling site should remain in Lewis; why can't Atlantic precincts be combined; an additional expenditure averaging \$3 per voter county wide is not sufficient to warrant reducing the number of precincts; why don't we have an all mail election system; all small towns should have a polling center because of the aging of the population; wasn't there a petition from about 60 residents of the Marne/Brighton Twp area; I consider the right to vote of first importance; why do we have to have all this equipment when our current system works well; believe savings of \$40,000 is substantial enough to approve change if the money is not funneled into other areas; Lewis has been around a long time and it is a viable community that will continue to grow; not sure that absentee ballots are counted, etc.

Chair Volk commented that change is difficult. A change in our voting system has been mandated. Estimates for equipment exceed available HAVA funding. Other portion of expense must come from local taxes. . .

Rieken suggested an alternative plan with reduction by 1 precinct: combine Edna with Noble and combine Bear Grove with Cass/Lewis. . .

Kinen commented that many Cass County residents drive to Omaha and other cities for shopping or recreational purposes. This is the average of one drive (or two if the person votes in at the Primary) in a two year period. Believe that election cost savings warrants approving the ordinance as written. . .

Auditor/Election Commissioner Dale Sunderman noted that the alternate method of casting a ballot by mail has become much simpler. In Iowa there has never been a question as to whether or not absentee ballots get counted. A mailed absentee ballot is rejected (considered spoiled) if the voter does not sign the affidavit envelope and/or if the affidavit envelope is not sealed. All eligible absentee ballots are tallied and are counted. In Cass County a very low number of absentee ballots are determined to be 'spoiled'. . .

Discussion concluded.

Chair read the proposed ordinance and noted that this was first reading of ordinance. An ordinance is adopted only after approval after the final reading. At least two public hearings and readings with approval after each and all readings in order to adopt the ordinance. Second public hearing and reading scheduled for July 28 at 7 p.m. at this same place if the ordinance is approved after first reading.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to approve the amendment of Ordinance #19 as written on first reading. For approval: McFadden, Kinen and Volk. Against approval: Rieken and Behnken. Motion carried. Ordinance approved upon first reading.

Thursday, July 28, 2005 PUBLIC HEARING- AMEND ORD.#19

Beginning at 7 p.m. a public hearing was conducted to consider amendment of Cass County Ordinance #19- Purpose: re-precinct to "effect a substantial savings in election costs. Board members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. Approximately 13 members of the public attended.

Hearing called to order at 7 p.m. by chair Volk. Opening remarks included: Within the strictures current legislation, the plan chosen by the board for consideration at these public hearings was to reduce the number of 'federal election' precincts from 17 to 13. Under this plan the persons affected are Edna and Noble Twp would combine with Pleasant Twp/Griswold; Bear Grove Twp would combine with Cass Twp/Lewis; Brighton Twp/Marne would combine with Grove Twp and Pymosa Twp and Washington Townships; and Franklin Twp/Wiota would combine with Grant Twp/Anita /Lincoln Township.

Rieken noted that he felt 17 precincts were needed to allow voters to vote in own township.

Behnken noted that no one likes being forced into any change. Federal HAVA legislation requires change, like it or not. He feared that reducing precincts would lead to persons not going to vote. He stated that he had yet to hear one constituent in his district request that the number of districts be reduced to save money.

Volk stated that in personal polling, about 70% of those polled responded to do that which would save money.

Public comment included: question as to why Atlantic precincts could not be combined; persons will not vote if they must drive extra miles; this is an urban versus rural problem; absentee voting an option; people do not like change- especially the more mature; cost per vote for mail ballot; long distance to polling site; do not like being forced to use a particular process; etc.

The chair called hearing to conclusion and noted that this was the second reading of ordinance. Whereas a summary of the amendment was published with the notice of the two public hearings and readings: Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to waive a third reading of the ordinance and take final action to adopt or not adopt the ordinance after this second reading. Roll call vote: carried unanimously.

Chair asked that the ordinance be read. Ordinance read by the board clerk. Chair asked the board if there were further discussion. none, the question was called.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to approve the amendment of Ordinance #19 on this second and final reading. For approval: McFadden, Kinen and Volk. Against approval: Rieken, Behnken. Motion carried. Ordinance declared to be adopted.

Resolution #08-24-05-01 Designation Regarding Targeted Case Management WHEREAS, Cass County currently provides directly or contracts for the provision of Targeted Case Management (TCM) services for certain populations of county residents; and

WHEREAS, the State Medicaid Plan requires that every county adopt a resolution designating the TCM provider for county residents who are on the Children's Mental Health Waiver; and

WHEREAS, in order to have TCM services provided to county residents in a timely fashion, it is crucial that each county make this designation as soon as possible; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors has fully considered all of the options available, including designating the county's existing TCM provider, designating another county and designating the Iowa Department of Human Services;

NOW THEREFORE upon motion by Rieken, second by McFadden: BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors hereby designates Pottawattamie County Case Management as its TCM provider for county residents who are on the Children's Mental Health Waiver. Carried unanimously.

Whereas it is believed that the provision of P.R.I.C.E. parenting seminars are beneficial to the citizens of the county: Motion by McFadden, second by Behnken to contribute \$1,800 to I Care About Kids, Inc for the provision of three four session parenting seminars. Carried unanimously.

"As part of the Help America Vote Act, the Dept of Health & Human Services has distributed funds for States to use for polling place access improvements and other associated activities." ... "Funds from the participating agencies will be distributed to the counties to provide for the cost of making polling sites accessible. Grants will be awarded for up to \$2,500 per polling site or 75% of the project, whichever is less." This is a matching grant and a reimbursement grant. Applications for grants must be submitted and then when approved, grant contracts will be sent to the county. Work will be completed and then a claim submitted to the state. Reimbursement will follow. Some of the sites are 'public' buildings and are being made accessible as polling places for townships (county subdivisions) in whole or in part. It is the consensus of the board that the county will participate in the 25% match for the 'public' facilities providing polling sites for townships. Specifics will be

decided later. Most sites require minor change: in most cases marking out and signing for van accessible handicap parking, replacement/addition of ADA compliant door handles, etc. Higher expense changes result if and when there is a need for creation of a solid surface (concrete pad, e.g.) before marking and signing or a decision has been made to install automatic doors.

The Cass County Board of Supervisors met at 9 A.M. with all members present: Don Volk, Chair; Chuck Kinen, Duane McFadden, Charles Rieken and Wm. Behnken. The minutes of August 31, 2005 were approved as read.

County Attorney Daniel Feistner reviewed current legal activity.

Jim Mailander on behalf of the Anita Foundation stated that a resolution of support for and any contribution toward the construction of a recreation center in Anita would be appreciated.

The facility would serve Anita, Cumberland, Massena, Wiota and the surrounding area in Cass County.

WHEREAS a Community Health Needs Assessment and Health Improvement Plan found that obesity was a significant health factor in Cass County; and WHEREAS the project being undertaken in Anita, Iowa to build a Health and Wellness Facility, encompassing a gymnasium, walking track, weight room, exercise room, and related facilities could help combat the problem; and WHEREAS, the facility can be an incentive to economic development and tourist attraction,

Motion by Kinen, second by Behnken: Resolved that the Cass County Board of Supervisors fully supports the efforts of the Anita Foundation to construct a recreation facility in Anita and supports the foundation's application for CAT funds. Carried unanimously.

WHEREAS, Chapter 15A of the CODE OF IOWA states that economic development is a public purpose for which the county may provide financial assistance

to or for the benefit of private persons; and WHEREAS, the Board believes that a recreational center/facility is both a community betterment and is also an additional incentive to attract tourists and businesses to Cass County; and WHEREAS, Local Option Tax may be expended for county betterment/development;

Motion by Behnken, second by Rieken to contribute \$32,500/year for each of two years from the Local Option Tax Fund toward the construction of an Anita area recreation facility. The first contribution is to be made when the project is assured of becoming a reality. Second contribution is to be made in the month of July of the next fiscal year for a total contribution of \$65,000. Carried unanimously.

District Conservation secretary Connie Esbeck delivered the 'Operation, Maintenance and Replacement Agreement' and 'Project Agreement' (between Cass Co. B.O.S.; Cass Co. SWCD and USDA NRCS) for four projects. Motion by Behnken, second by Rieken to enter into agreement for construction of four Turkey Creek Watershed grade stabilization structures on sites 1-1, 4-2, 10-17 and 10-18 (estimated cost of \$400,000, fully federal funded). Carried unanimously.

An amendment to the SWITA 'Sale of Service' transportation contract was considered: provides for a 2 cent fuel surcharge for each 10 cents of fuel cost exceeding \$2.00 beginning Sept. 1, 2005.

Motion by Kinen, second by McFadden to approve the fuel charge amendment to the SWITA 'Sale of Service' contract. Carried unanimously.

A petition was filed against the county and two sheriff's deputies 01/14/2004. The case Marty and Janet Mardesen v. Cass County claiming damage to personal property during a legal search of a residence has been settled for a payment to Mardesens of \$15,000. ICAP, the county's liability insurance carrier covers the cost less the deductible.

Motion by McFadden, second by Kinen to approve the claim for the \$3,000 deductible. Carried unanimously.

Sheriff Bill Sage stated that he expects deputies to act in accord with standard operating procedures. The above behavior took place under a previous administration. Unbecoming behavior will not be tolerated.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity. EMA director Rob Koppert was present. In light of resettlement of evacuees and the possibility that some may come to Cass County, is the board considering waiving residence requirement for general assistance? B.O.S. will discuss. Most evacuees coming to Iowa will probably settle near Des Moines. Rob inquired of State about possibility of some being moved to Cass County. Reply: 90% probability NO. Those who may come probably will come because relatives reside here. State is applying to federal government as a funding source.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects. Motion by McFadden, second by Behnken to approve the change of classification from maintenance (probationary status) to operator 1 (permanent status) for Secondary Roads employee Mick Sager. Carried unanimously.

This contract, entered into by and between Cass County, Iowa A body corporate and politic, Hereafter called "the County" And MATT PARROTT AND SONS / HENRY M. ADKINS & SON, INC. Hereafter called "Parrott / Adkins" Witnesseth:

WHEREAS, the County has need for vote tabulation systems equipment, hardware and software, and training and technical support services, to the county election office as the election authority for Cass County; and

WHEREAS, in reliance upon the federal "Help America Vote Act" (HAVA), Parrott / Adkins has advised the County that Parrott / Adkins reasonably believes the United States government will appropriate and fund portions of the proposed value of the equipment and services to be provided; and WHEREAS, The County has met all of the prescribed rules for requesting or soliciting bids or proposals, accepting bids or proposals and entering into contracts provided for by the State of Iowa; and

WHEREAS, Parrott / Adkins is willing to deliver the equipment to the County, and provide the necessary services to the County, on the expectation that said funding will occur at a later date; and

Now, Therefore, it is agreed between the parties as follows:

- 1. Parrott / Adkins shall provide all equipment, hardware, software, training, and services to the Cass County Auditor's Office that is set out in the proposal "Exhibit A" attached to this Contract and incorporated by reference herein.
- 2. The maximum amount due Parrott / Adkins under this contract shall be \$132,359. The County shall pass through to Parrott / Adkins such sums as are received by the County from the United States government's funding under the federal "Help America Vote Act" (HAVA).
- 3. Parrott / Adkins understands and expressly agrees that the County has not made any type of payment for said equipment and services to be provided by Parrott / Adkins.
- 4. Parrott / Adkins covenants that it is possessed of the necessary qualifications and experience to train and support the personnel necessary to operate the equipment, hardware, and software specified in the proposal marked exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.
- 5. Parrott / Adkins will warrant, repair, and if necessary replace the equipment, hardware, and software specified in the proposal marked exhibit "A" for one year after installation date.
- 6. Neither party may assign any of its rights or duties under this Contract without first obtaining the written permission of the other party.
- 7. This Contract shall constitute the entire Contract between the parties. This Contract may not be altered, amended, modified, or supplemented, except in writing signed by both parties. All notices given pursuant to this Contract shall be in writing, and shall be delivered to the other party by hand, or by delivery to such party's regular business address by certified mail (return receipt requested).
- 8. The terms of this Contract shall not be affected by or interpreted according to any custom, industry or business practice, or course of dealing, whether between the parties, between or among party, other persons or entities, or between or among other persons or entities.
- 9. The terms of this Contract shall be governed by the laws in the State of Iowa; United States of America on the day the last party executes this Contract.
- 10. All litigation regarding this Contract shall be taken in the court having appropriate jurisdiction in the State of Iowa, United States of America.
- 11. In case this Contract, or any one or more of the provisions hereof, shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable within any governmental jurisdiction or subdivision thereof, the Contract or any such provision or provisions shall not as a consequence thereof be deemed to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any other governmental jurisdiction of subdivision thereof. In case any one or more of the provisions contained in this Contract shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any other respect, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision of this Contract, but this Contract shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained therein, and there shall be deemed substituted such other provision as shall most nearly accomplish the intent of the parties to the extent permitted by applicable law.

This contract was approved by Cass County, a body corporate and politic, by its governing body at a meeting held on the 14th day of September, 2005, authorizing its County Board of Supervisors to execute this Contract.

A property owner inquired regarding taxes and assessment on property purchased to display farm equipment. Does the board have the authority to change the value on property used as a 'museum'. The property was purchased believing that the taxes would remain level. The assessed value and taxes have increased markedly. Can the property be reclassified or can the county provide a tax break?

County assessor asked to comment: the state requires commercial property to be assessed at fair market value. No other classification is available. Exemption status probably requires that a corporation be established and that the corporation file for non-profit tax exempt status.

Owner had concerns in regard to outcomes including property ownership if a corporation was established and if tax exempt status was obtained and then later the corporation was dissolved. County attorney will research the matter.

Recorder, treasurer and engineer noted that their associations each had statewide websites. Rob Koppert suggested that some goals for a site be set before making a decision on what type of site (static or dynamic) to have. Taken under advisement with further discussion/ possible action set for 11/23.

MH/DD/GR Coordinator Teresa Kanning reviewed departmental activity.

County Engineer Charles Marker reviewed current road projects. Middle K and South K surfacing completed and finish work and painting expected to be completed this week. Painting of G-35 planned to be done now also. Crews are mowing, doing general maintenance and patching.

SWIMHC director Emerson Link reviewed the center's finance report for year ended 06/30/05. Economically a 'bad year' with greater expense and more highly discounted revenues- Service Revenue: Gross \$974,881; Adjustments \$523,714; Net \$451,167 (about 46.27918% of billed).

He reported that all SWIMHC reserves are gone. Income based on cost report is expected in near future. However, it is likely to be more than 30 days before payment is received. During budget considerations the Center requested that additional funds be designated for a possibility such as this. I am requesting approximately \$10,000 to get the Center through the period until additional revenues are received.

Supervisors asked if payment of two month's of county block grant in current month would work. Can then review issue near end of fiscal year. Director indicated this would be acceptable.

Koppert commented that all government levels must adopt and use National Incident Management System (NIMS) by September 30, 2006. Taken under advisement with consideration again on Nov. 30.

At 11:30 a.m. the Board recessed to the Cass County Memorial Hospital for the quarterly Home Care/Chore Services meeting.

WHEREAS, despite the past efforts of housing initiatives, additional funding and tools are needed to continue to address the need, and there is now an ability to form and receive funding for a local housing trust fund through the Iowa Finance Authority; and

WHEREAS, Southwest Iowa Planning Council (SWIPCO) has worked with counties and communities on region-wide housing initiatives for well over a decade, Cass County is in the SWIPCO planning area and is party to the 28E agreement that governs SWIPCO, and the SWIPCO Policy Council has approved the creation of the Southwest Iowa Housing Trust Fund, Inc. (SWIHTF), a corporation dedicated specifically to the housing needs of the region; and WHEREAS, SWIHTF is preparing to be recognized in the SWIPCO area as the designated housing trust fund, which will be staffed by SWIPCO.

Motion by McFadden; second by Behnken:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Cass County Board of Supervisors that:
 It designates Southwest Iowa Housing Trust Fund, Inc. as the official housing trust fund for the county and endorses the efforts of SWIPCO and SWIHTF to establish and operate a local housing trust fund for the region, consisting of Cass, Fremont, Harrison, Mills, Montgomery, Page, Pottawattamie (excluding the City of Council Bluffs), and Shelby Counties in Iowa.
