

Results of 2021 Great Backyard Bird Count

Overall it was a great year for Iowa in the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC). The Cass County Birders were 7th in the State! Iowa overall was lower in species and in checklists happening, but our fantastic showing of 47 checklists was not enough to beat top BIG counties in the state 1st place Johnson County with 181 checklists, with Polk, Story, Linn, Scott and Black Hawk behind them. We were 9th in the species count, we had many usual species missing this year. With the new eBird system the record keeping is by county so I cannot really tell you anymore the species reported for each town unless we record them, but Cass County as a whole. Iowa as a whole had 100 species reported and 1,445 checklists! United States reported 665 species and 223,400 checklists. The GBBC is a global bird count sponsored by the National Audubon Society and Cornell Lab of Ornithology, globally 6,449 species and 328,800 checklists. Since 2002 the Cass County Conservation Board has advertised this bird count throughout the county encouraging citizens to participate. Typically participants submit their checklists on the internet, however, for those that are not comfortable using computers, the Conservation Board collects the data and enters the checklists for them. 

<u>Live Plants</u>

- Live plants from nursery will come as small plugs (or larger); cells are 5" deep x 2" wide at top or 4.5"deep x 2" Cone.
- Immediate care: remove plants from container as soon as possible and water thoroughly.
- Plant in the ground or a larger pot.
- Keep area around plants weed free, especially during the first growing season.
- Watering is important during the first growing season. Make sure the plants do not go dry for the first 3-6 weeks; water deeply to allow formation of deep drought and frost resistant roots. Once established, native plants can withstand extreme weather.
